CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Concepts and models related to population-focused nursing with emphasis on community, health promotion, team building, assessment strategies, and planning approaches.

DETAILED COURSE DESCRIPTION

Welcome to Nursing 531, Nursing 531 examines the theoretical models, concepts, and roles related to populationfocused Community Health Nursing practice within the Canadian health care system. The content focuses on: foundations of Community Health Nursing theory and practice; primary health care; population health promotion; community assessment; planning and evaluation processes; and Community Health Nursing intervention strategies that are effective with populations and health care systems.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Students in Nursing 531 will be provided with opportunities to:

- 1. Examine the historical and conceptual foundations of Community Health Nursing.
- 2. Explore the dimensions of primary health care and the relationship with Community Health Nursing.
- 3. Analyze the evolution of the population health promotion approach and its meaning in terms of Community Health Nursing.
- 4. Assess a community, using a nursing model and selected community assessment strategies and skills from Community Health Nursing.
- 5. Discuss the perspectives, stages, and elements of planning approaches to Community Health Nursing.
- 6. Describe the intervention approaches of health education, mass media, policy development, and community development in Community Health Nursing.
- 7. Examine the components and strategies of evaluation used for health planning with populations in Community Health Nursing.
- 8. Explore future perspectives in Community Health Nursing.

STUDENT MISCONDUCT

Plagiarism is a serious offence which will result in the following penalty and application:

1. In cases in which the dean and/or faculty is satisfied that a student is guilty of plagiarism, cheating or other academic misconduct in circumstances which suggest a clear intention to deceive or otherwise commit an academic offence, the normal penalty will be either suspension or expulsion from the faculty.

2. In cases in which the dean and/or faculty is satisfied that an offence has been committed, but doubt is left as to the existence of a clear intention to deceive or otherwise commit an academic offence, the normal penalty will be probation.

3. In cases where a student is found guilty of more than a single offence, the normal penalty will be expulsion from the faculty, and in the most serious cases, expulsion from the University.

While it is recognized that scholarly work often involves reference to the ideas, data and conclusions of other scholars, intellectual honesty requires that such references be explicitly and clearly noted.

Plagiarism occurs not only when direct quotations are taken from a source without specific acknowledgement but also when original ideas or data from the source are not acknowledged.
