



DART

THE DOMESTIC ABUSE RESPONSE TEAM

IN COLLABORATION BETWEEN ALBERTA HEALTH SERVICES, THE RED DEER REGIONAL HOSPITAL CENTRE (RDRHC) EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT (ED), AND CENTRAL ALBERTA OUTREACH SOCIETY, TO PROVIDE CRISIS INTERVENTION TO PATIENTS WHO ARE EXPERIENCING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE ACCESSING SERVICES AT THE RDRHC ED.




115 FEMALE AND 17 MALE

WITH DART. PATIENTS
SEEN BY DART RANGED IN
AGE FROM 16 YEARS TO
OVER 55 YEARS.



38% OF THE PATIENTS WHO WERE SEEN
BY DART HAD CHILDREN
68% HAD ADDICTIONS OR MENTAL
HEALTH ISSUES OR BOTH.
11% DISCLOSED A HISTORY OF SEXUAL
ASSAULT.
